#### Shining in the World Scholar's Cup

We could hear our hearts pounding as we arrived on the first day of the World Scholar's Cup competition. However, we began to relax as the coordinators asked us to dance and cheer. A stuffed alpaca was even thrown to the audience. The alpaca is a relative of a llama, and is also the mascot of the World Scholar's Cup, an international competition that the six of us, Nathanael Winoto, Michael Leonardo, Ryan Batubara, Michelle Lie, Catalina Tan, and Alicia Sutandar from IICS Junior High competed in on May 6-7 2017.

We competed against 400 other students from schools across Indonesia. The three boys made up one team, while the three girls made up another team. Mr. Darren, who had been training us for the past four months, accompanied us. We competed in four categories: writing, Scholar's Challenge, debate, and Scholar's Bowl, based on six areas: Literature, Arts and Music, Science and Technology, History, Social Studies, and Mythologies.

Our weekend started with writing persuasive essays, followed by an hour to individually answer 120 questions. Soon, we had to spend 3 hours debating non-stop. We won two out of three debates each. The next day, we had to answer 200 questions as a team by choosing a button on a "clicker" that corresponded with our answer.

Our amazing weekend ended with earning a total of 47 medals, including 24 silver and 23 gold, as well as one team trophy. The boys won gold medals in debating and Scholar's Bowl, and a trophy in the Scholar's Challenge. The girls won gold medals in writing.

Our journey has not ended, for both teams have qualified to move to the next stage - the Global Rounds. The girls team will be competing in Hanoi, while the boys will be competing in Athens. The wonderful aspect of the World Scholar's Cup competition is that it is not just about winning. It is a celebration of learning, the showcase of everything we have learned with Mr. Darren. The memories, the unforgettable experiences, and the bonds we formed, will truly be engraved on our hearts for years to come.

# How to Finish Well?

"Those who sow in tears shall reap with shouts of joy! He who goes out weeping, bearing the seed for sowing, shall come home with shouts of joy, bringing his sheaves with him."

When was the last time you recall having wept for your children before the Lord, as you sought to raise them up and train them for godly living?

I am a Christian, a parent and a teacher. As teachers at IICS we are charged with the responsibility to serve your children as, in loco parentis, which is Latin for, in the place or role of a parent, while they are with us. So, we are teacher or parents.

Being a Christian teacher is a tough, but glorious job. Why do I say tough and glorious? Because you are not only teaching, which is a teacher does but, you're also representing Christ whom you follow, which is what a Christian does. (Christ-ian: Christ means Messiah; ian means follower). Now, add parenting into that mix! I remember what a preacher once said: "To believe in Christ, costs nothing. To follow Christ, costs something. To serve Christ, costs everything."

Let me explain briefly. When I first believed in Christ, accepting Him as my Lord and Savior, I realized that it cost me nothing, but it cost Christ everything to save me. He suffered and died on the cross for my sin!

And, then, I felt a desire to follow Him. At that time, I began to realize that following Him would cost me something. One significant cost that I needed to "pay" to follow Him was: decreasing my ego, and letting Christ alone increase in me. As John the Baptist famously stated, "He [Christ] must increase, but I must decrease." John 3:30

As I began to follow Him, I received the calling to be a full-time minister. Not only did I go to Bible School and start to serve God in several churches before joining IICS, I also started my own family and became a father. I believe I now have a better understanding than before and, I have learned, that through all of

these seasons: to serve Him, indeed, costs everything!

But, the good news about following and serving Him is: no matter how great the cost, the reward of seeing the "fruits" of our labors brings such great joy!

Now, as we approach the end of this academic year, we need to ask ourselves two important questions: Have we finished this academic year well, in following and in serving Him? How do we know whether or not we have finished well?

- Discuss with your kids about the sexuality topics such as the difference of men and women, wet dream, menstruation, pornography, and dating. If you keep silent, the children will obtain the values of the topics above from the world. Can you accept that if it happens?

- Story telling before bedtime
- Family dinner
- watching movie together
- Car trip together
- Daily incidents (at school or around home)

A saying says the silence is golden, but silence is not golden in children sexuality education. Silence will not stop the children curiosity. In consequence, let us be more open in responding the children curiosity so that they can obtain the right values of sexuality.
