Believing is Living

"Believing is Living" is IICS's yearly theme for this academic year. The theme was taken from John 20:31 "But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name."

In addition to teaching knowledge and science, we

wish that our student of all levels to learn God's words so they can also grow and live in faith and this theme helped them to understand by believing they may have life in His name.

Therefore, we try to hold activities which will support our purposes. The following are:

Spiritual Emphasis and Enrichment Days (SEED)

SEED - Kindergarten

On the 24-25th July 2018, IICS Kindergarten had our annual program, Spiritual Emphasis and Enrichment Days (SEED). We hoped this first program would welcome our students to the new academic year and introduce them to our yearly theme. This year's theme is "Believing is Living," which is taken from John 20:31, "... Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life..."

During the SEED days, students started their day with a children service in the chapel. They praised and worshiped God through songs and movements, and followed by a sermon. This year, our theme song is titled "He is God". The students were introduced to the song and excitedly did the dance movements during their praise and worship. They also listened to the word of God which instilled their faith in Jesus Christ.

Next, the students went to their classes and made an art activity which was also based on our yearly theme.

The students painted around a picture of a cross with

their fingers to create a clean look of the cross so that it looked as if the cross was shining. The students' art work was put into a frame along with the student's individual picture on their first day of school. We hoped this simple art work reminded the students of their faith in Christ and how we may have life in believing Him.



SEED - Elementary

For this year's SEED, the theme "Believing is Living" was chosen. The theme was taken from John 20:31 "... Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life..." This theme helped the students to understand how they can live eternally with God in Heaven through believing in the Bible, God the Father, Jesus God the Son, and the Holy Spirit. In the beginning of this academic year, the students were introduced to God's truth about the gift of eternal life. The students learned that as they believe this truth, they will be able to live eternally in Heaven with God.

During SEED, students listened to the Word of God in the Chapel, delivered by Mrs. Leonny Atmadja (day 1-3). Students learned that the Bible is a special letter God gives to us so we can learn and know more about Him. He created the world and all that were in it. We can see His creation all around us. His love is so great that He sent His one and only Son, Jesus, to the world. Jesus was willing to die on the cross to take the sin of the world. He died in our place. He is our Savior. He also sent His

Believing is Living

Our school's yearly theme this academic year is "Believing is Living". What does that mean? This yearly theme is taken from John 20:30-31 which says, "Now Jesus did many other miracles (or signs) in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ (Christ means Savior), the son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." (from ESV)

Thus, "Believing is Living" means (based on the verses above): As we read and/or observe all the miracles that are written in the Bible, we may believe that Jesus is the Savior of the souls and He also the Son of God, and by believing (in Him) we may have life in Jesus' name.

At a glance the meaning of these verses are appealing and easy to understand: Reading leads to Believing and Believing leads to Living. That's it! But as we look deeper we (at least me!) may feel uneasy and confused.

Why? Because these verses use the word "may" instead of "will". Thus, reading all the miracles written in the Bible doesn't guarantee that I WILL believe in Jesus as my Savior, and when it doesn't guarantee that I WILL believe in Jesus as my Savior then it also doesn't guarantee that I WILL have life in Jesus' name. So, what do we need to do then so that we may experience the Life that is in Him by Believing in Him as we are Reading His holy book?

First, we need to understand that "to believe" in Jesus is not based on our attempt or effort. We are able to believe in Jesus because He planted a faith in us long before we realize it. Therefore, without God planting

this faith in us we will not (not may not!) going to believe in any word in the Bible.

Second, we need to understand that the faith that God planted in us is not a "dead seed". It is alive and active and it works alongside with our characters as we grow and evolve in our understanding concerning life, self, and God. And during that process of growing and evolving, we may still have doubt - it is normal and healthy! As a father myself, I would rather have my son expresses his doubts to me and stay with me than walk away from me and pretends that he trusts in me, while actually he does not. So, it is OK to doubt as long as our doubts lead us to get closer to God. Doubt until you doubt your doubts .

So as we understand correctly the two concepts above, do go and read the Bible. And as you read, do ask many questions to our Lord and stick with Him until He answers your questions. And as you wait for His answer, enjoy the ups and downs of your spiritual journey. My prayer is that you may see for yourself that you will never truly alive until you truly believe. Believing is living, indeed!

World Mathematics Invitational (WMI) 2018

After the preliminary results were revealed, the students received an invitation for the WMI final round in South Korea in July 2018. The result was: 1 Silver medal achieved by Michelle Erine Tan and 2 Bronze medals achieved by Nathan Keith Poernama and Ryan Y. Batubara!

According to Nathan K Poernama, "The WMI completely supports our drive to compete and prove ourselves through the short amount of time given to complete a fairly complex set of mathematical problems. Not only that, I find this competition as a chance to meet and socialize with people of higher intelligence and reasoning that happen to not only exceed in math, but also in other prominent sectors of life. All in all, I find this competition valuable and enjoyable, not just for the accomplishment I made, but for the priceless experience and new friends I made that I will treasure."

The International Junior Math Olympiad (IJMO) 2018

The International Junior Math Olympiad (IJMO) is an international mathematics competition, which is a continuation of Singapore and Asian Schools Mathematics Olympiad (SASMO). To be eligible for participation in IJMO, only SASMO Gold and Silver awardees from each country are selected to represent their country. This year, there were 19 countries that participated in IJMO 2018, in Bangkok, Thailand, from 27-31 July 2018. Two of IICS eighth graders: Johanes Dharmawan Wihardjo (8.3) and Kylie Shane Haryono (8.2) joined this competition and won bronze medals.

IJMO is organized by Singapore International Math Contests Centre in collaboration with the National Math Societies in Asian countries, to identify and encourage potential young math talents. It aims to provide an Asian platform for students to interact and compete against their worthy opponents.

Kylie Shane wrote, "I must say I was very doubtful at first, because this was my first time going abroad for a competition. The ceremony night was surely memorable, because we got the chance to exchange gifts with people from all around Asia. The competition itself was hard, but the learning experience was meaningful. Overall, this whole journey was interesting."

I originally participated in the Junior High Mathematics OSN but did not make it to the nationals so I decided to try something new that was still related to logic and problem solving. Many of my sister's OSN friends switched

from mathematics to computer so she encouraged me to try it. The first programming language I learned was Pascal back when I was still in my old school. I found it to be interesting and decided to follow my sister's suggestion. As a new student, I was bold enough to approach Ms. Farida, my Computer Concept teacher, and told her my wish to participate in the 2017 Computer OSN.

Once again, I did not pass to the nationals, but I did not give up. I tried again the following year and was

lucky enough to pass. Although I unfortunately missed getting a medal by two places, I was happy to have been able to get to know many new people, especially the eight friends and six teachers I trained with for over two months. I learned many new algorithms and competitive programming skills, and this increased my passion in programming. Prior to my participation in the OSN, I did not have enough time to prepare much due to school assignments. I did a few past OSN selection papers, trained myself in answering combinatorics and logic questions, and reflected on what my mistakes were in the previous years. I only started practicing competitive programming after I passed to the nationals. I know that what I have learned during the OSN is just a tiny portion of the existing programming skills in the world. I hope to continue learning and improving my programming skills, not only in the competitive programming field, but in other computer related fields as well.

A visit to the local children's group at their church as well as multiple visits to Bukit HarapanCuntel allowed us to truly appreciate the things that we are not able to experience in big cities. The trip allowed us to not only renewour perceptions but also to refresh our minds to prepare for the challenges ahead.





The Sepa Field Trip 2018

It is by God's grace that the Year 11 Biology students of 2018 went to Sepa Island in the Thousand Islands, north of Jakarta, for a two-day trip. The weather was clear, and the sea was relatively calm during the time we were at the location, and throughout the journeys both in and out of the island. The work done in the field trip is a part of an Assessment Task for the Preliminary HSC Biology course. The students were introduced to the marine wildlife and also to the coral reef monitoring exercise.

The work included observing population density of various organisms, establishing the distribution of organisms along a transect line, observing the degree of corals' health, and measuring various physical parameters of the area.

The data gathered will allow for a comparison between the tourist-designated area and the more pristine area of the island. The students also got the teamwork experience in a rather challenging environment. Such an exercise is vital to prepare them to be stewards of the environment as part of the global community (ESLR #4), and also to become independent critical thinkers who are able to apply what is learned to new situations (ESLR #2). Overall, students really worked hard and enjoyed the natural environment.





Bahasa Indonesia Excursion 2018

On May 21st – 24th 2018, all Year 11 embarked on a journey to discover the authentic Javanese culture through Language excursion in Wukirsari Village, Yogyakarta.

We boarded a train to Yogyakarta, before continuing on a 30-minute bus ride to Wukirsari. Upon arrival, we were sent directly to our respective housings using a pickup truck. Our first activity was batik-ing. The process includes drawing patterns, coloring with canting (small dipper for applying wax). The group spent the night watching Wayang (puppet) show of the famous legend "Gatot Kaca Kalajaya."

On the second day, the students learned to carve and colour Wayang sculptures, Arjuna, Bima, Srikandi, Sinta, and Yudhistira. In the afternoon, we learned to play traditional Javanese music using Gamelan. In the evening, we went for a walk around the village through residents' houses and lavish paddy fields.

On the third day, all participants learned to make a special ginger-based drink, originated from Yogyakarta, Wedang Uwuh, before stopping by at Prambanan Temple, and taking a quick stroll along the world-famous Malioboro district. At 8pm, we headed back to Jakarta on Argo Dwipangga train. It was a fun-filled excursion, away from the hustle-bustle of Jakarta, one that has amazed our students with the richness of Indonesia.

It was clear that they enjoyed the time spent on this event, thankful that the school made this possible.



Significant Durpose

On a dining table, a number of tableware was placed, there were spoons, forks and knives on the table. A curious boy asked his mother "Mom, which is the spoon?" His mother replied, "This is the spoon, this one with the rounded end." The boy then continued "Which is the fork?" His mother then replied, "This one with the sharp head that branches into several narrow and slightly curved tines."

A simple conversation at the dining table attracted my interest to get to know more about how we recognize a spoon or a fork. We can easily distinguish them from visible physical attibutes. The spoon is designed with the round end asit is used to hold food while the fork has branches with several protruding ends to pick up food.

Like the spoon and fork in the illustration above, God also equips our children with a variety of uniqueness that can be easily seen, such as personalities, interests, abilities and many others. This uniqueness will be used by God to carry out His mission in the world.

"For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." (Ephesian 2:10, KJV)

The above verse clearly states that nothing happened by chance, because God created us for a clear reason from the beginning. As a parent, how should we help our child find the purpose of their creation? This is not an easy matter as it requires patience and a long process.

Rick Warren in his book "The Purpose Driven Life" mentions several things that can be the concerns of parents to help children find their purpose in life:

• **Spiritual Gift:** Spiritual gifts are an important part in shaping our child's character. Spiritual gifts are given by God to each of our children to be prepared to do God's missionary work. This gift will grow in our children after they believe in God. Various kinds of spiritual gifts are used by God to continue His mission in the world such as the gift of teaching, the gift of saying wisdom, the gift of healing, etc.

- **Heart:** Heart or in other word, interest, is the driving force to do everything. As a parent, you can recognize your child's interest from what he likes, what he speaks enthusiastically and what makes him happy when he does certain tasks. Interest is used by God to clarify what your child's calling is.
- **Abilities:** Abilities are natural talents that God has given since they were in the womb of mothers. Each child has a different talent; this is what distinguishes one child from another. Just like the spoon that has a different characteristic over a fork. Encourage your child to discover what his talent is and persevere.
- **Personality:** According to Allport's definition, personality is "a dynamic organization of the psychophysical system (body soul) in an individual who also determines a unique (typical) way of adapting to his environment." Personality is one of the parts that make up everyone. Personality is a benchmark that influences how and where a person can use spiritual gifts and abilities. For example, an IT personnel requires someone who is detailed and pays attention to small things, unlike a marketing personnel, who requires an easygoing and persuasive person.
- Experience: The last thing and no less important, is the experience God has placed in the lives of our children. Unpleasant experiences are usually used to shape a person in an extraordinary way, the one that God allows to happen for a purpose. Experience is used by God to sharpen one's character and calling.

Finally, we really hope that the above can help parents to continue encouraging children to find their goals in life. May our children continue to grow in the way God has prepared for them from the beginning.

IPEKA Care For Lombok

A series of earthquake in Lombok, West Nusa Tenggara (NTB) has been occurring for a month. The National Board for Disaster Management has recorded 1.005 earthquakes since august 5th 2018. As this article is being printed, we have a record of 515 deads and 7,145 injuries. These numbers have not included the severely damage infrastructure and various post-earthquake traumatic experiences that needed recovery. They need to be restored, not just from trauma, but the spirit to look forward to the future.

Touched by the victims suffering, the family of IPEKA Christian schools was moved to help them as a form of love and care. Through good cooperation with students and parents, donations that have been collected amounted to Rp 1,030,000,000.
