When I witnessed this positive enthusiasm within these children, I felt touched and amazed. Most of us would barely jump or feel excitement during praise and worship sessions in chapel, yet these children were wholeheartedly praising God with all of their might, despite their problems and limitations. If these people could love God so fervently, how much more could I give to be closer to God?

When I got the chance to personally serve or play with these children, I experienced the true love of God and the joy that comes with it. I spent a significant amount of time with this one girl who was born deaf. She couldn't listen to my voice, nor could she listen to the music being played. Yet, as I briefly communicated, danced, and played with her, her face of joy and happiness brightened up my day. She didn't care about what I was saying or about what was going on around her. All she cared about was that I took some time to care for her. I saw light in her eyes that I had never seen in any other individual. That light transformed my retreat. We were directly exposed to the application of God's love, and our hearts were opened to love God more. During this retreat, the hope to grow as believers was planted in us, by us planting hope in the eyes of another.

Mid-Cycle Visit Review

On 12th & 13th November, IICS received a mid-cycle visit from ACSI (Association of Christian Schools International) & WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges), represented by Dr.David Wilcox (Assistant Vice-President, Global ACSI Global) and Dr. Ed Tackett (WASC Accreditation Consultant).

In 2015, IICS was granted a full accreditation for 6years. Three years have now passed and, as per ASCI & WASC policy, it was time to review the progress IICS has made. They arrived at the school very eager to engage with parents, learners, teachers, IPEKA directors as well as the leadership team. They held focus group meetings, visited classrooms, looked at the facilities and got an overall feel of the IICS experience.

At the end of the second day, they were ready to give feedback. We are so proud to announce that the visiting committee commended our school on the following:

- The school leadership for articulating and adhering to the mission and vision statements and schoolwide learning outcomes in order to accomplish the stated purposes of the school.
- The school leadership and faculty for providing a positive and nurturing environment for students in order to foster social, emotional, and spiritual growth and development.
- The school leadership for modifying room placements and teacher schedules to promote a collaborative environment for professional dialogue related to student assessment resulting in a greater emphasis on data-driven decision-making practices within the school.
- The school leadership and faculty for giving the needed attention not only to the major critical areas for growth, but for also satisfactorily addressing the minor recommendations from the previous self-study and visiting committee that have further improved the effectiveness of the school in meeting the stated goals.
- The parents for their support of the school's mission and instructional program resulting in a positive partnership between parents and administration and faculty.
- The leadership team and faculty for providing a wellmanaged and structured school environment that promotes safety, an understanding of expectations, and fosters student character development.





As for the recommendations, the committee indicated that there are areas for improvement. Surely, we at IICS will follow through to make sure all of the recommendations are fulfilled by the time of our re-accreditation in 2021.

We would like to give a huge thanks to all teachers, staff, students and parents, who continue to make IICS a school striving towards Christ excellence.

Sentulfresh Edufarm

IICS Kindergarten believes in the benefit of experiential learning, especially its ability to increase understanding. A farm field trip was an excellent way to provide students with an experience that engages all of their senses and stimulates their curiosity. This visit was bursting with opportunities for students to get in touch with nature and learn a lot about plants and animals.

K5 students of IICS enjoyed their first field trip to Sentulfresh Education Farm! Sentulfresh introduced students to the daily farming activities. The students started the day by feeding the fish. There were Patil fish, Bawal fish, and Giant Catfish. Then they continued with a fun activity where they fed the birds (doves) but then they were also given a chance to try and catch the birds. They were thrilled trying to catch the birds.

Going around the farm had given the students the chance to observe and learn many different things. They observed medicinal plants, lovebirds, deer, worms, rabbits, hamsters, roosters and turtles. They learned how to identify which cow produces milk and how to make yoghurt from the milk. They also experienced the sensation of milking fresh milk from the cow. Some students were excited, but some just chose to watch their friends milking the cow. The farmer also let the students ride on the calf! The students were so brave!

On the farm, abstract ideas became tangible. We hope that this experiential learning that engages the students could promote long-lasting appreciation, understanding and connection to education, community, and the environment.





Elementary Field Trip to Engineering for Kids

From 30 October to 1 November 2018, our Elementary students had their first field trip to Engineering for Kids® at SDC Gading Serpong. The students were introduced to STEM (Science-Technology-Engineering-Math) education activities. This project-based learning lets the kids discover how things work, build their critical thinking, engage in problem solving, and learn math and science in a positive environment.

The students were all happy and excited for the interesting projects they did. Grade 1-3 students made a conductor pen, a sketch bot, and an ice cream. Grade 4-5 students learned how to make a bottle rocket, a simple kaleidoscope, and a lightsaber. The students learned that simple air pressure can push a rocket more than 45 meters in the air. They also got a chance to launch the rocket using pressurized water and air. As for our older students, Grade 6's learned something more complex: robotics. The students explored different types of sensors and applied them to the robot models. When all of the students had completed the activities, they had an opportunity to play on the playground before they finally went back to school.









East Nusa Tenggara Dances





The Elementary department's Indonesian Culture annual event was held on October 12. This time we introduced the East Nusa Tenggara culture. The event showed East Nusa Tenggara dances which include 3 dances, i.e. Ja'l Dance, Dero Dance and Gemu Famire Dance.

Moreover, the students were introduced to some traditional musical instruments which supported the dances. Some dancers from Flores community danced the Ja'l Dance enthusiastically. They also invited some students to participate in the same dance.

The second dance was the Dero Dance. The Dero Dance is a unity dance to celebrate harvest time or to celebrate a person's success in achieving his/her dreams. This time the students were asked to join the dance in circles and followed the feet movements of the dancers.

The last dance was the Gemu Famire Dance. This is the latest and most popular dance throughout Indonesia. The students had fun participating in this dance on the stage.

Through the introduction of East Nusa Tenggara culture, we hope the students could get a glimpse of how rich and diverse Indonesian culture is. There is this saying in Bahasa Indonesia, 'Tak kenal maka tak sayang' (If you do not know then you cannot love). Hopefully through this event the students' love for Indonesian culture can grow and develop.

Palu and Donggala Earthquakes

The 7.7 Richter scale earthquake and tsunami followed by liquefaction (a moving land surface phenomenon and the plague that caused all buildings to be destroyed) hit Palu and the surrounding area in Central Sulawesi on September 28, claiming thousands of victims.

Based on the records of the National Disaster Management Agency (BNPB), the missing victims reached the number of 835, more than 2,000 casualties were buried, while a further 10,679 people were injured. However, the exact number of victims who died is very unlikely to be known, given that a number of residential areas were swept away by the tsunami and liquefaction. It buried many people along with their houses.

Infrastructure or facilities are severely damaged, not to mention various types of traumatic experiences after the earthquake, tsunami and liquefaction. They need to be restored, not only from trauma, but the enthusiasm to look to the future.

Seeing these conditions, IPEKA was moved to help them as a form of love and care. Through good cooperation with students, parents, teachers, and employees of IPEKA Christian School, the donations that have been collected were Rp. 1.153.601.643.

Donations were collected to support the construction of temporary shelters, repair of earthquake-damaged school buildings as well as for various urgent needs by the people there.
