IICS Senior High Study Trip presents UNLOCKING YOU Project - UK

This study trip was specially designed for Senior High students. It consisted of workshops, university visits, and some sightseeing adventure. Extensive multicultural exposure prompted the students both to engage their theoretical knowledge and to practice various skills acquired at school. Each workshop was designed to last 2 hours. The topics and activities included Robotics, Chelsea Business Football, Mock Trials, Car factory visitation, Afternoon Tea Etiquette, CSI project, and Punting in the River Cam.

The students applied their knowledge from Robotics class by assembling and programming racing cars at the Robotics workshop. At Stamford Bridge Stadium, the students learnt how the football business was run at Chelsea Football Club.

At the Mock Trial, the students had a chance to enact a scenario based on a real trial case they had to analyze. Students played their roles as a judge, prosecutor, witness, victim, lawyer, defender, and clerk respectively.

The fourth workshop was dedicated to Royal British Afternoon Tea Etiquette. Students had an opportunity to learn about the history of tea, and the afternoon tea tradition in British culture. The next day they proceeded to punting. By trial and error, the students learnt the difference between Oxford and Cambridge punting styles: in Cambridge the punter stands at the rear of a boat, while Oxford style implies standing at the front. Though none of the students had punted before, they genuinely enjoyed the activity: each of them got a chance to practice, refined their grip, and completed their round trip journey along the River Cam.

The last workshop prior to our return to Jakarta was the CSI project. The students had a unique opportunity to act as detectives in a criminal case scenario. They were exposed to investigation procedure and discussion. By working together, they managed to solve the murder mystery.

The workshops offered a brilliant perspective on how the students relate to each other: we could observe them working closely in an informal setting, and further encouraged their natural need for collaboration and unity. Regardless of the fact that our days overseas were literally packed and the program appeared to be intense to the point of tiring, the students enjoyed all its aspects and gained some precious insights from the overall experience.



Japan Immersion: An Experience of A Lifetime

Has it always been your dream to visit foreign countries and interact with the societies there? If so, then we're both on the same page!

Hi. My name is Reuben Mishael Then, from class 8.2 at IICS. I'm one of the students who participated in the Japan Immersion trip in March 2019.

On March 3, 2019, 34 students representing IICS departed from Indonesia for Japan. We went to several meaningful museums on this trip, such as: the Minato Mirai Museum (Mitsubishi Minatomirai Industrial Museum in Yokohama), Yamanashi Maglev Exhibition Center, the Maritime and Fishing Museum, and the Mount Fuji Museum. These places taught me much about Japan's long history, and they highlighted Japan's ability to be self-sufficient in the field of industry, despite the lack of natural resources.

Being warm and kind are two of the characteristics of Japanese people, and I observed these through the students I met in the Japanese schools. We first went to Nagai Elementary and Secondary School. The students there were genuinely hospitable and friendly, and I happily made friends with them. Due to the language barriers, we had to communicate with each other through social media and with Google Translate.

IICS KINDERGARTEN SCIENCE DAY

On Friday, May 3rd 2019, K5 students had some fun in doing experiments during Science Day. The students did four experiments to build up their observational skills and excitement about science. The first experiment was about mass and weight; "Float and Sink". The students were given a number of objects for them to experiment with and asked to observe and make notes on which objects will sink and float. The students were curious about it as they put the objects in the water one by one.

The second experiment was to make a parachute toy. The students were asked to predict and make hypotheses of what will happen if they dropped the parachute from a high place and if putting an object inside the plastic cup would affect the speed of the parachute when it fell.

The next one was to recreate the ocean wave in a bottle. This was a delightful way to bring the ocean home! The students were assisted by the teacher to pour the water and the oil into the bottle. Then, they swished the bottle back and forth, side to side, to see how the energy they formed from swishing the bottle moved the water inside the bottle, just like the waves in the ocean.

The last activity is to pump the balloon using baking soda and vinegar. They need to mix baking soda with vinegar. This mixture will produce carbon dioxide (CO2) that will eventually pump the balloon on its own. By doing this experiment, the students learned about the components of air that are usually invisible to their eyes.

The students thoroughly enjoyed all experiments they did in class. Exploring, observing, analyzing, and making conclusions came naturally with these fun hands-on activities. We hoped these experiments will improve their critical thinking skills as well as boosting up their confidence in taking safe risks to experiment and make mistakes while learning.

GenDigital

When we commenced on this journey to mentor young learners who had neither touched an iPad, nor entered a password on their mobile devices, nor surfed the Internet before, we could not even imagine the impact it would create on the students, their parents, and even ourselves!

Back in November of 2018, we aspired to utilize our passion and knowledge in coding to give back to the community. Back in the grade 11, we learned that there was a certain group of children who belonged to the Alpha Generation, a generation that was expected to be exposed to technology and digital media from a very young age. However, here in Jakarta, we found out that a lot of these children were unprivileged and did not have the necessary facilities to acquire these essential digital skills in a timely manner. We were introduced to a group of third and fourth graders who studied in Bimbel Setia, a non-profit course located just opposite GKY Puri. These children had seldom been exposed to technology, or as some of them put it, 'buta teknologi'. Hence, we capped off this GenDigital project, basing it on the vision to raise generations after generations of informed digital learners. Not for a moment did we consider this project as a burden. Right from the start, we realized how precious such a blessing may become: to have just the right opportunity to impact young learners with the talents we have.

Every Saturday morning, we would teach basic coding concepts to the kids at Bimbel Setia, using child-friendly applications like 'Scratch Jr' and 'Lightbot'. During our first module, we engaged with our iPads, so that the children could get a firsthand experience on how to operate, code, and create projects while interacting with already familiar apps. Occasionally, we would include fun VR and AR activities. By the end of the first module, the students created their final project that they proudly presented in front of their parents and friends at our first ever GenDigital Graduation event. Today, these kids continue building their digital literacy by learning more intermediate concepts through 'Scratch', as they slowly master the art of coding using the laptops that we provided at Bimbel Setia. In an attempt to engage, encourage and nurture even more digital learners, we also hold monthly Hour of Code events that aim to inspire and introduce the world of coding to the numerous unprivileged students in Jakarta.

Looking at the students' progress today, we are really proud of the improvements they have demonstrated since our first lesson and utterly grateful for their effort and commitment. We believe that God has led and helped us to work in the lives of these kids, so that they can be equipped with the necessary skills in the future! All to Him!

Cyber Pedagogy: The 21st Teaching and Learning workshop with Prof. Dr. Ir. Richardius Eko Indrajit

"The teacher's role in the learning process will never be replaced by technology, but those who do not use technology will be replaced soon. That is the reason why teachers must never stop learning because when they stop it means that they stop being a teacher." This was stated by Prof. Dr. Ir. Richardius Eko Indrajit, M.Sc., M.B.A, an expert in informatics and science, during Cyber Pedagogy's Workshop: The 21st Teaching and Learning which was held in IPEKA Head Office on March, 29th, 2019.

The workshop aimed at equipping leaders, principals, and also all IPEKA Christian School teachers in facing the challenges of 21st century education. Prof. Richardius Eko Indrajit explained that in the era of industrial revolution 4.0, teachers were no longer the only source of knowledge in the classroom. Even now the cyber world has helped educate our children, so it is important for teachers to master "cyber pedagogy" as a method of learning in the classroom.

Prof. Richardius Eko Indrajit who is the Head of the Indonesian ID-SIRTII internet supervisory institution, as well as active members of the National Education Standards Agency (BSNP) Professional Certification National Agency (BNSP), National Research Council (DRN) and Higher Education Council (DPT) said "educators, teachers can use anything to make their children smart."

Furthermore, he invited all leaders, principals, and IPEKA teachers to realize that educators must adapt to changes. We should not use the old learning method, in the middle of this growing era. He also emphasized that technology was created not to replace the role of the teacher, but technology can help educators in facilitating the learning process so that the performance of the learning process can be more interesting, improved, and better.

To summarize, Prof. Richardius Eko Indrajit invited all IPEKA teachers to re-realize their role as educators in making students "addicted to learn" by making them happy in learning. When they enjoy learning, no matter how difficult it is they will survive.
