However, **the spiritual heart transplant is free!** The doctor (Jesus) is ready, everything has been well prepared, even without appointment, **and solely up to the patient to willingly accept the “surgery”.** Are you whole-heartedly ready to embrace this free gift from the Lord Jesus Christ?

It is my hope and prayer that the year 2020 is a year where our hearts are renewed and transformed to be more like Jesus.

Through these activities, we are so grateful for God's blessings in our lives.



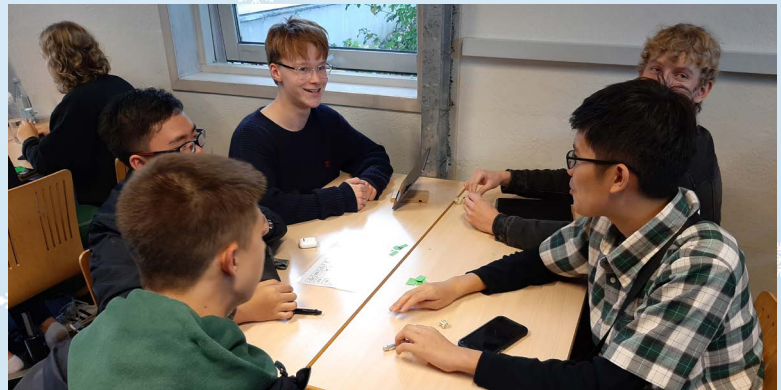
Students Exchange Program, IICS at Odsherreds Efterskole (Denmark)

Building Close Relationship Between Siblings



Have you ever heard the story about the Poernomo Brothers? Three brothers (Ronald, Arnold and Reynold Poernomo), owners of dessert bars in Australia which are famous to foreign countries. Arnold and Reynold themselves are famous chefs who play a role in food processing at the restaurant. Meanwhile, his eldest brother Ronald, played a role in business development. Not only their success, their brotherly relationship also attracts attention. In an interview, Ronald admitted that their closeness had been built since childhood. The three often spend time together to play in the kitchen of their mother who is also a chef. The closeness sometimes experiences conflict, especially when starting a joint culinary business because each feels smarter and more capable than the other. However, the conflict can be resolved well because they realize the meaning of their closeness so that each of them wants to lower their ego. Now, the Poernomo Brothers' hard work in managing the culinary business has made them successful in the list of the richest young people in Asia (30 Under 30 Asia List) by Forbes Magazine.

It would be so happy if your children were close to their siblings, like the Poernomo Brothers story, right? Of course this is every parent's hope. However, some parents still consider a child's relationship with his or her sibling is something that can be built by him or herself, without parents involvement. In fact, building closeness between siblings must be done early on and parental involvement is very important. Simple things, such as building relationships between relatives turned out to have a significant role in one's development. A study shows that adolescents who have closeness with their siblings tend to have good emotional and behavioral adjustment (Veld & Engels, 2010).

Building closeness between siblings does require a process, such as building a sturdy building. Before making a building, a contractor would need a blueprint or a design of the building to be built. Similarly, a child also needs a blueprint

about how closeness to siblings is formed. An example on how parents build relationships, both with children, as well as with siblings and family can be a blueprint for children in building relationships with siblings. A psychological study also revealed that children who are close to relatives generally have a close relationship with their parents (Veld & Engels, 2010).

The next process that must be carried out is to plant the foundation. A strong foundation will make the building sturdy. The question is on what foundation the relationship will be built? The strong foundation parents need to instill in children is the word of God. Proverbs 22: 6 says *"rain up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it"* (KJV). The values of God's word, such as loving and accepting must be taught so that children realize that closeness with their sibling is something that God wants, like God's Word in 1 John 4:21: *"And this commandment have we from him, That he who loveth God love his brother also."* (KJV)

In the process of building, each brick used needs to be bonded with cement. Likewise, relations between siblings need to be cemented through the quality time. For parents, this time can be used to carry out activities to build the cohesiveness of children, such as making shared skills (cooking, building construction, etc.). In the time spent together, sometimes children face negative situations (conflicts and quarrels). Moments like this can actually be a mean for children to learn to find solutions in relationships. As a parent, you can train them to control their emotions, empathize, negotiate and forgive one another. Thus, every process that children go through in a relationship with their siblings can benefit them later on. Closeness between siblings that has been formed automatically makes it easier for children to love, forgive and accept their siblings in any condition.
